Location and boundary of the Architectural Conservation Area

The ACA is comprised of five structures in all, a terrace of three buildings on Church St. and two terraced buildings on Chapel St.

Historical development of the area

The Leslie family who occupy nearby Tarbert House completed in 1720, were instrumental in the early development of Tarbert in the mid 1700s. Tarbert had developed into a thriving commercial port by the early 1800s; exporting agricultural produce from the surrounding countryside. In 1831 when the bridewell was built it had 148 houses, a hotel, a large cornstore, Protestant and Catholic churches and a Wesleyan meeting house and work was commencing on the coastguard station and the lighthouse.

The special character of the proposed ACA relates to the window and door surrounds and quoin detailing found on these buildings. There are no Protected Structures or Recorded Monuments within the proposed ACA

Implications of ACA designation

Within the ACA there are restrictions on certain works to exteriors of structures. In addition to the usual requirements of planning law, works that would materially affect the special character of the ACA may require planning permission. Works such as the removal of historic building fabric and its replacement with modern materials will require planning permission. Refer to Section 5 - ACA of the text.
